March 29, 2018 - CALGARY, ALBERTA - In light of a recent <u>CBC article</u> citing a Calgary mover who has been charged with uttering death threats against clients, BBB and the Canadian Association of Movers are warning consumers about the potential pitfalls of hiring movers.

BBB and CAM urge consumers to always check the following when looking for a professional mover:

- Ask the mover about shipment valuation and licensing. Shipment valuation is the total value of a shipment agreed upon in order to secure a specific freight rate. Also find out what your household insurance will and won't cover during a move.
- Verify the mover's claims, credentials and professional **memberships.** Scammers and fly-by-night operators won't be able to substantiate a good reputation.
- **Insist on in-person inspections to obtain accurate price estimates.** While it is possible to get quotes over the phone, it's best to have movers inspect your area in order to accurately understand how much, and what exactly, you will be moving.
- **Get everything in writing.** Try to obtain three different written estimates in person from different movers. Also ask for written documentation of special terms and conditions, complete costs, payment timelines and warranty information. If it's not written down, it doesn't exist.
- Check out the company's rating with BBB and standing with CAM. BBB and CAM provide trustworthy and relevant information about moving companies and contractors. Check out a company's rating with BBB, complaint history, verified customer reviews and other important information. Check with CAM for a detailed <u>consumer checklist</u> for hiring a qualified mover.
