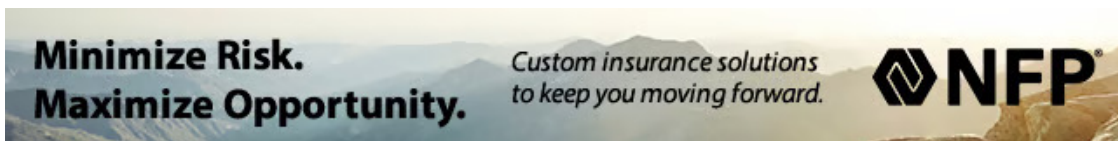
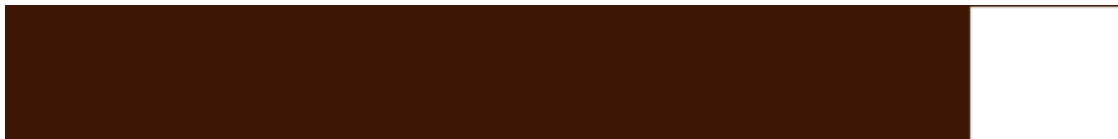

Start 2026 with purpose!

Mentoring has quietly become one of the most valuable ways to grow a career, strengthen an industry, and start a new year with purpose.

During November, Marian and I mentored a team of six University of Waterloo students on a variety of half-finished projects that, for the most part, were technology-driven. For me, the experience reinforced how much learning flows both ways when people at different stages of their journey intentionally work together.

Students as real-world partners



These students did more than complete assignments; they stepped into real CAM projects that demanded curiosity, accountability, and collaboration. In return, they gained practical experience that textbooks cannot replicate: working with real deadlines, real stakeholders, and real consequences for the quality of their work.

From a mentor's side, not only did we propel some projects across the finish line, but we also had to slow down to explain the "why" behind decisions, and break complex issues into manageable steps, all the while remaining open to fresh perspectives that challenged the "it's always been done this way" ideology that is pervasive in our industry.

Each conversation sharpened skills in coaching, feedback, and listening – the very leadership muscles that can get neglected in the rush of day-to-day operations – skills both Marian and I will need to sharpen as we look to expand our staff in the next year or so.

How mentoring elevates mentors

One of the best recent examples of this in the CAM community comes from Susan Lamash, VP at [**Eager Beaver Moving & Storage**](#) in Edmonton. Susan recently mentored a business student on a capstone project and watched him grow from uncertainty to confidently presenting his work solo to a whole room.

What stayed with her was not just his success but how the experience refined her own leadership: adapting the project to his strengths, offering direct, detailed feedback, and staying present through the ups and downs of the journey. As Susan put it, mentorship does not simply lift someone else – it elevates you and reminds you that the mentor is also the student. You can read more of Susan's story below.

Mentorship Elevates You as Well

"Mentorship does not simply lift someone else; it elevates you," says Susan Lamash, Vice President of **Eager Beaver Moving & Storage**.

"It reveals your capacity to guide with clarity, patience, and purpose. Every time you say yes to mentoring a student, you say yes to becoming a stronger leader."

In September, Susan was invited by the Edmonton Chamber of Commerce to mentor a Grant MacEwan business student named Jackson for his capstone project—an opportunity that turned out to be far more meaningful than she expected.

Although the project began as a marketing assignment, they soon realized Jackson's real strength lay in numbers, so they shifted focus to data and market analysis. Jackson's discipline and integrity were remarkable—he verified every detail, built his own tools, and produced thoughtful insights without relying on shortcuts or AI.

Despite setbacks, including a lengthy commute, a missing partner, and presentation hiccups, he showed grit and professionalism, ultimately delivering a strong solo presentation that made Susan immensely proud. Watching Jackson's growth reminded her why mentorship matters—and convinced her that he'll thrive wherever he goes.

Susan has the following advice to fellow leaders, *"keep your doors open to unexpected opportunities and to the students who show up ready to learn. Because growth has a way of meeting us in the moment we least expect, often delivered by the people just beginning their own journey, and the Mentor is also the student."*

The Future of Tech Innovation (where humans lead and AI executes)

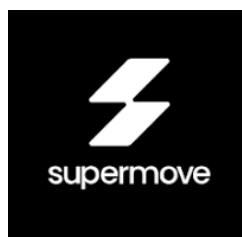
"Moving processes are very manual," says Mark Miyashita, Co-Founder and CTO at Supermove, winner of CAM's 2025 Innovator Award. In this 23:54-minute presentation, Mark talks about the progress already made in the moving industry and the possibilities that artificial intelligence (AI) will bring to enhance and make our industry more efficient.

Mark says that the companies that will lead are those that learn AI and move the fastest. In his presentation, he says you can do this in three ways:

1. Use a central system where workflows are executed.
2. Figure out the high impact problems that AI can help solve.
3. Empower your team to use AI tools to manage and aid their existing work.

"The goal is efficiency - you want to be able to handle more moves while also still providing a stellar customer experience," he concludes.
